The longest-running antique car show in the country

In this 67th year of the Old Car Festival, we celebrate the centennial of the Lincoln Motor Company. When General Motors president (and pacifist) Billy Durant refused to allow Cadillac to build engines for allied aircraft in World War I, founder Henry Leland, with his son Wilfred, resigned in protest. In August 1917, they established a new company for the purpose. Henry Leland named the company after the first president for whom he had cast a ballot: Abraham Lincoln. The Lelands remade their company into a high-end automaker in 1920, but the weak postwar economy forced them to sell to another father-son duo, Henry and Edsel Ford, in 1922. Under Ford ownership and with Edsel Ford's skilled guidance as president, Lincoln flourished to take its place among America's finest luxury marques.
