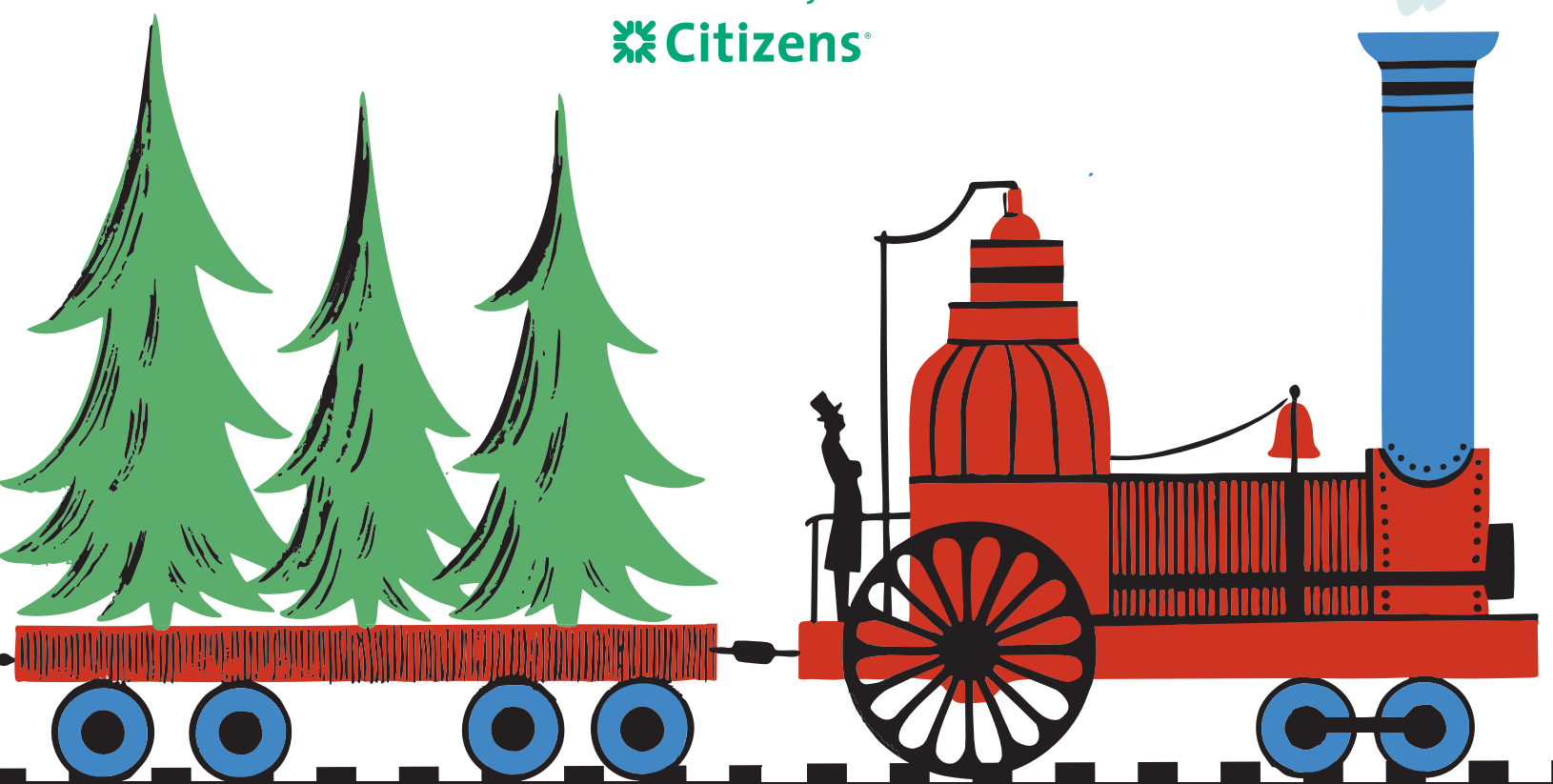

By the 1930s, Christmas trees were sold nationwide. Stop by our re-creation of a 1930s Depression-era Christmas tree lot.

49 Holiday Postcards, 1905 (Phoenixville Post Office)

Stop by to purchase and mail a reproduction holiday postcard.

55 West Side Electric and Shoe Repair Display Window (Next to Wright Cycle Shop)

This is the actual business that occupied this storefront from 1918 to 1936 in Dayton, Ohio.

56 A Wright Family Christmas, 1900 (Wright Home & Cycle Shop)

See a reproduction of the Wright family Christmas tree based on a circa 1900 photograph. Next door at the Cycle Shop, hear the exciting tale of the first flight in December 1903.

59 Menlo Park Lights (Menlo Park)

Months of preparations resulted in a functional electrical system that could illuminate the entire countryside. Learn why December 1880 was so important to Thomas Edison — and to all of us today.

Magic Lantern Show

(Corner of Post and Christie, Near Menlo Park) Witness an early form of projection picture shows of Dickens' classic *A Christmas Carol*.

60 Sarah Jordan's Park House Lunch Room (Sarah Jordan Boarding House)

See how Sarah Jordan transformed her boarding house into a restaurant, serving hungry tourists drawn to the electric lights of Menlo Park.

60 A Forest Ranger's Christmas (Next to Sarah Jordan Boarding House)

Visit our early 1900s USFS Ranger camp to learn about their role in sustainable conservation.

61 Holiday Silent Movie (Outside Fort Myers)

Take a photograph with a holiday backdrop, and enjoy early Edison holiday-themed silent movies.

66 Covered Bridge Photo Op (Ackley Covered Bridge)

68 Maryland Tidewater Plantation Life (Susquehanna Plantation)

Listen to stories that highlight some of the struggles and hopes of enslaved people at this time of year.

71 1760s Winter Evening (Daggett Farmhouse)

In 1760 Connecticut, Christmas was not observed. Peek in to see what a typical winter evening might look like for the Daggett family, including weaving demonstrations.

72 World War I YMCA Hut-France 1918 (Cotswold Stable)

Visit a YMCA canteen where U.S. soldiers are spending their holidays awaiting a lasting peace. December 4-7 and 12-14

73 World War II-Era Red Cross Hospitality Station (Cotswold Cottage)

In 1944 wartime England, U.S. troops were stationed throughout the country, including the Cotswolds. Visit this Red Cross Hospitality Station and hear about the holidays.

74 Winter Social Season in New Hampshire (Giddings Home)

Step into the urban home of prosperous merchant and shipbuilder John Giddings and enjoy the rich aroma of chocolate being made.

75 1830s New Year's Open House (Noah Webster Home)

Join the Websters for an 1830s New Year's open house in New England, complete with a silhouette party.

78 1910s Christmas Dinner (Edison Homestead)

Enjoy the sights and smells of a roasting Christmas goose and a sideboard laden with holiday treats.

81 1930s Christmas (Mattox Home)

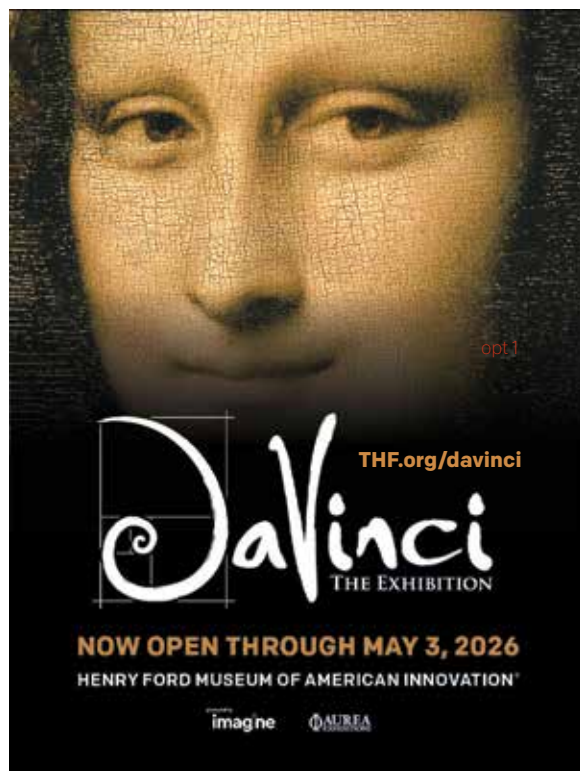
